## ALBERT ADAMS (1929 - 2006)

Albert Adams spent most of his adult life in England, having grown up under South African Apartheid rule, which was the initial inspiration for his paintings and prints reflecting themes of suffering and injustice.

He was born in Johannesburg in 1929. His father was Indian and his mother classified as 'Cape-coloured'.

Albert was refused entrance to the University of Cape Town's Michaelis School of Fine Art because of his skin colour, so Albert worked as a window dresser while saving up to enroll for a teaching degree.

He was actively involved in the anti-apartheid movement, but after being arrested twice, applied to study art in England, where he won a scholarship to study at London's Slade School of Fine Art from 1953-57.

He then won a scholarship to the Munich School of Art. He was exposed, during this time, to the expressionist work of Oskar

Kokoschka (which had been branded 'degenerate' by the Nazis).

Oscar Kokoshka recorded an address for Albert's first major solo exhibition in Cape Town in 1959, in which he said: "We live with closed eyes, not daring to see the misery we create on earth. The task of the artist is to see."

After the Sharpeville Massacre in 1960, where police killed 69 people during an anti-apartheid protest, Albert moved to London permanently, where he continued to bear witness through his art to injustices and inhumane acts perpetrated internationally.

Britain's wars in Afghanistan and Iraq affected him deeply and he joined a 'Stop the War' march in London in 2003. He based several works on nightmarish newspaper images of prisoners at Abu Ghraib in Baghdad and Guantanamo Bay, Cuba.

His contribution has ultimately led to his recognition as one of South Africa's great 20th Century artists.


